



YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin: AODA Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation- Employment Standard Policy

Intent

This policy is intended to meet the requirements of the Integrated Accessibility Standards, Ontario Regulation 191/11 for the Employment Standard set forth under the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005. This policy applies to the provision of accessible employment services for people with disabilities.

All employment services provided by YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin shall follow the principles of dignity, independence, integration, and equal opportunity.

Scope

This policy shall apply to every person who deals with members of the public or their agents on behalf of YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin, whether the person is an employee, agent, volunteer or otherwise.

Definitions

Accessible Formats - include but not limited to large print, recorded audio and electronic formats, braille, and other formats usable by persons with disabilities.

Communication Supports - include but not limited to captioning, alternative and augmentative communication supports, plain language, sign language and other supports that ease effective communications.

Conversion Ready - an electronic or digital format that eases conversion into an acceptable format.

Designated Public Sector Organization - refers to every municipality and every person or organization listed in Column 1 of Table 1 of Ontario Regulation 146/10 (Public Bodies and Commission Public Bodies-Definitions) made under the Public Service of Ontario Act, 2006.

Educational or Training Institution - is an institution governed by the Education Act or the Private Career Colleges Act, 2005; offers all or part of a post-secondary program leading to a

degree pursuant to a consent granted under the Post-secondary Education Choice and Excellence Act, 2005; a designated public sector organization (defined in the regulation); a public or private organization that provides course or programs or both, that result in the acquisition by students of a diploma or certificate named by the Minister of Education as defined in the Education Act.

Educator - is an employee who engages in a program or course design, delivery, and instruction, including staff of school boards.

Information - includes data, facts and knowledge that exists in any format, including text, audio, digital or images, and conveys meaning.

Kiosk - an interactive electronic terminal, including a point-of-sale device, for public use that allows users to access one or more services or products.

Large Organization - an organization with fifty or more employees in Ontario.

Mobility Aid - a device used to facilitate the transport, in a seated posture, of a person with a disability.

Mobility Assistive Device — a cane, walker, or similar aid.

Obligated Organization — Organizations may include workplaces, businesses, or services. Refers to the Government of Ontario, the Legislative Assembly, a designated public sector organization, a large organization, and a small organization to which the standards of this Regulation apply.

Performance Management — activities related to assessing and improving employee performance, productivity, and effectiveness with the goal of facilitating employee success.

Redeployment — the reassignment of employees to other departments or jobs within the organization as an alternative to layoff when a particular job or department has been eliminated by the organization.

Support Person — in relation to a person with a disability, another person who accompanies the person with a disability to help with communication, mobility, personal care, or medical needs, or with access to goods, services, or facilities.

General Principles

Following the Integrated Accessibility Standards, Ontario Regulation 191/11, this policy addresses the following:

- a) General Requirements
- b) Employment Standards Overview
- c) Recruitment, Assessment and Selection
- d) Accessible Formats and Communication Supports for Employees
- e) Documented Individual Accommodation Plans
- f) Plans and Processes
- g) Return to Work and Redeployment

a) General Requirements

General requirements that apply across all the three standards, Information and Communications, Employment and Transportation, are outlined as follows.

Establishment of Accessibility Policies and Plans

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will develop, implement, and support policies governing how it will achieve accessibility through these requirements. YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin is responsible for including a statement of its commitment to meeting the accessibility needs of persons with disabilities in a timely manner in its policies. This should be achieved through documentation in YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin's policies and making these documents publicly available, in an accessible format upon request.

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will establish, implement, maintain, and document a multi-year accessibility plan outlining its strategy to prevent and remove barriers and meet its requirements under the IASR regulation. YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will post its accessibility plans on their website, if any, and supply the plan in an accessible format upon request. YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will review and update its accessibility plan once every five years and will set up, review, and update its accessibility plans in consultation with persons with disabilities or an advisory committee. Annual status reports will be prepared to report on the progress of steps taken to implement YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin's accessibility plan and post this status on its website. If requested, the report shall be created in an accessible format.

Procuring or Acquiring Goods and Services, or Facilities

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will incorporate accessibility criteria and features when procuring or acquiring goods, services, or facilities. The only exception is in cases where it is impracticable to do so.

Training Requirements

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will provide training for its employees and volunteers regarding the IASR and the Ontario Human Rights Code. Training will be provided for individuals who are responsible for developing YWCA St.

Thomas-Elgin's policies, and all other persons who provide, goods, services, or facilities on behalf of YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin.

Self-Serve Kiosks

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will incorporate accessibility features when designing, procuring, or acquiring self-service kiosks. YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will always be aware of the accessibility features of self-service kiosks for persons with disabilities.

Exemption from Filing Accessibility Reports

Small organizations are exempt from filing accessibility reports if it is consistent with a phased approach to implementing the regulations set forth in the IASR, allowing the organization to focus their efforts and resources on following the accessibility standards.

b) Employment Standards Overview

The Employment Standards regulation will expand Ontario's labour pool by ensuring people with disabilities are welcome and supported within all workplaces. Employment standards will aid organizations with employment recruitment, providing accessible information, plans for emergencies, individual accommodation, return to work, performance management, and career development and redeployment.

c) Recruitment, Assessment and Selection

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin must notify employees and the public about the availability of accommodation for job applicants who have disabilities. Applicants must be informed that these accommodations are available, upon request, for the interview process and other candidate selection methods. YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin must notify the successful applicant of their policies and supports for accommodating people with disabilities.

d) Accessible Formats and Communication Supports for Employees

If an employee with a disability requests it, YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin must provide or arrange for the provision of accessible formats and communication supports for the following:

- i. Information needed to perform their job; and
- ii. Information that is available to all employees in the workplace.
- iii. YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin should consult with the employee making the request to determine the best way to provide the accessible format or communication support.

e) Documented Individual Accommodation Plans

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin must also develop and have in place written processes for documenting individual accommodation plans for employees with disabilities. The process for the development of these accommodation plans should include specific elements, including:

- i. The ways in which the employee can participate in the development of the plan.
- ii. The means by which the employee is assessed on an individual basis.
- iii. The ways an employee can request an evaluation by an outside medical expert, or other experts (at the employer's expense) to determine if accommodation can be provided, or how it can be achieved.

- iv. The steps taken to protect the privacy of the employee's personal information.
- v. The frequency with which the individual accommodation plan should be reviewed or updated determined, and how it should be done.

The means of providing the accommodation plan in an accessible format, based on the employee's accessibility needs.

f) Plans and Processes

Any department within YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin that utilizes performance management tools, or provides career development and advancement to their employees, must respect the accessibility needs of their employees with disabilities when developing these processes. Every department within YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin must provide a tailored workplace emergency response plan or information for employees with disabilities if their disability makes it necessary.

g) Return to Work and Redeployment

YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin must develop and have return to work processes in place for employees who are absent from work due to a disability—and require disability-related accommodations to return to work. YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will need to document these processes. The return-to-work process must include an outline of the steps YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin will take to facilitate the employee's return to work and use documented individual accommodation plans (as described in section 28 of the regulation). If YWCA St. Thomas-Elgin uses redeployment processes, they must consider the accessibility needs of its employees with disabilities. Redeployment may mean the reassignment of employees to other departments within the organization as an alternative to a “layoff” when a particular job or department has been eliminated. These standards do not apply to volunteers or other non- paid individuals.
